


We sailed Casco Bay to Cow Island and had a traditional lobster bake for lunch. Bill and Rita Bunch relaxed in the hammock strung between two trees.


Dinner was on our own for the evening and as you can see most people had not had enough lobster yet - - - - except for Bob Chalk!




We had such a good time that night. Here are a few more photos.

Thank you for helping us along!

As we move through 2010 it has presented it's own set of challenges. We have been very fortunate to have sold and delivered 38 units as of the end of July which is a 20% increase from this time last year in both new and used sales. With this trend we have doubled our North Chicago employee base from 2009 to accommodate the slight increase in new production to meet the coming demand. We are very happy to be able to bring back some of the employees that had to be laid-off due to manufacturing adjustments.

We have now implemented the Lithium-Iron Phosphate battery technology across our entire product line which has increased our lower bay storage and overall weight carrying capacity. We had started this transition with our H3-45 Triple Slide #718 and now all units from Liberty Coach #723 forward will include this advanced technology.

Liberty Coach Updates for 2010 by Frank Konigseder

Lower Bay Entertainment Center Update, Apple iPad integration and the new Volvo D13 Engine

Being in a coach driving across the country always seems to spark our creativity and desire to continually improve upon our existing designs. The past few months we have been working on a change we are excited to show you. Just in time for football season, we have completely redesigned the lower bay entertainment center starting with coach #722. The new slide-out/swivel mechanism we have engineered allows us to include a 46" LED TV with a high powered virtual surround sound speaker system that incorporates a Marantz home theater processor. The complete system utilizes a very small footprint and will definitely be marveled at by not only our customers but by our competition as well.

And not to be sleeping at the wheel on the electronic technology side of things, we have also incorporated the new **Apple iPad** into the Crestron Remote control system. Utilizing the Crestron App from Apple we can now add the **iPad** to any Liberty Coach back to coach #668 as long as you have an Apple laptop.

I would also like to touch on the coming change in regards to the Volvo D13 engine implementation for the new Prevost shells. This new system is the only one industrywide that meets the EPA's near-zero NOx emissions requirement. While this change will be a more environmentally friendly alternative, it will present draw backs to the customer. The rear area of the H3-45 will see an approximate 20% loss of closet space added to the loss realized from the engine exhaust stack. Additionally, each coach will now have a 32 Liter Urea additive tank which must be refilled (by purchased containers) every 2nd fuel fill. The Volvo motor will be the model D13 which is a 13 liter engine producing 500 HP and capable of generating 1750 ft-lbs of torque. This will still be coupled to the Allison Gen-4 transmission we currently use.

Other news coming out of Prevost is the planned change for the XL-II model shell. In the coming months I will be able to relate to you all the information that becomes available with regards to this change, but as it stands now the XL-II production will end and it will be replaced with a modified version of the Prevost Entertainer Shell. This 45 foot shell will look like the current XL-II but will have a longer wheel base which means it will have a longer turning radius. The shell will have an increase in headroom of 3" over the current XL-II which means that it will be 6" taller inside than the H3-45. This shell will have the same, if not more, difficult challenges related to interior and lower bay storage losses that the new H3-45 faces but we are working to design the most efficient use of the new space. At this time we are anticipating receiving the new XL model sometime in late 2011. When more information becomes available I will pass it along.

I can't stress enough how good it makes us all feel to see you out at the events that we have attended. No matter what kind of coach you own its great to see you enjoying the lifestyle that we continue to promote and live. We extend an invitation to all of you to join us at a rally soon on our "**Good Life Leisure Tour**".
