

DETOURS

You are happily driving your coach on a stretch of interstate when the traffic starts to slow and then comes to a complete stop. You wonder what's happening because you see no signs to indicate why you have stopped. At this point you turn on the CB, only to learn from the truckers moving along on the other side of the highway, that there are several miles of road construction ahead. They suggest if you want to keep moving you should take the next exit and detour around the construction.

Follow the orange detour signs. More than likely, you do not have to imagine this scenario—you have been in similar situations. One minute you are making great progress, and the next minute you are changing course. You may get to your destination late. The detour will cost you time and money. You are getting annoyed with the folks in cars who like to drive on the shoulder because they are seemingly better than everyone else and are too important to wait. Admittedly, you sort of like it when truckers block their path. One good thing...you have a bathroom in your coach!

For those who attended the North Carolina rally, we know all too well about detours. Thankfully, we had a heads up about the I-40 rockslide repair so we could change our travel arrangements. Ron and I planned a totally different route getting to the rally to avoid any of the rockslide detour, but leaving Lake Lure after the rally we had no choice but to take a detour.

Because we were heading to Prevost in Nashville (the leak is fixed!!), we had to get to Interstate 40 on the other side of the rockslide. That meant driving almost 100 miles out of our way (100 miles at 6 mpg at \$3+ per gallon...you do the math!). If we had been driving the truck we probably would have taken a curvy mountain road, but there was no other way to go driving a 45-foot coach.

I have been keeping a travel log in the same atlas from the day we began full-timing over 10 years ago. I have highlighted all the roads we have driven in the coach and marked where we have stayed with self-adhesive colored Mark-It dots and the date. (Some day I want to get a large United States map, have it mounted on cork board and use push pins to indicate where we have been, but I digress.) Because we have been blessed to travel for so long, there are many times I do not need to highlight the road because we have been there before.

Do you know what I found when I checked our journal after our lengthy detour? I was surprised to find we had never before been on those stretches of I-26 and I-81! I was sure we had driven these roads on previous trips, but my journal/log indicated differently.

Want to know something else about this detour? It was an absolutely gorgeous stretch of highway! Mountainous terrain with redbuds, azaleas and dogwood all in glorious bloom. Horses laying flat on their sides sleeping blissfully in the sun and cows with their calves grazing on fresh pasture. Streams and rivers rapidly flowing with fresh, icy-cold water. Quaint little mountain towns where folks spend their entire lives...cradle to grave...and they would have it no other way! And we would have missed all of it, if it hadn't been for that detour!

I guess there's a life lesson or two in this, isn't there? Perhaps the lesson is simply to slow down, relax and appreciate the beauty around us. Maybe it's to welcome life's detours because we may be surprised what we learn along the way. Or it may just serve to remind us that we will get through the rough patches we encounter along the way. It's funny what an annoying detour can teach us.

You can draw your own conclusions, but as for me, I found we weren't the only folks on the highway...we weren't detouring alone.

So the next time the detour sign appears we all have a choice. Will it be "Oh no, a detour" OR will it be "Let's see where this take us"?

We are very pleased to have 2009 under our belt and are looking forward to great things for 2010. I continue to stress to all of our employees how lucky all of us are to still be doing what we love for a great bunch of people considering how much the market has changed in the past 18 months. We finished 2009 with total sales of 54 new/used units which was down about 40% from previous years. As of March 2010, we have sold 21 new/used units to date. Liberty Coach utilizes new battery technology

Beginning with the Prevost Triple-slide H3-45, a “greener” battery system will now be in place.

The newest Liberty Coach Prevost H3-45 Triple Slide-out features brand new battery technology. By changing to the new Lithium Iron Phosphate battery technology we were able to eliminate 1150 pounds of total weight from our H3-45 Triple-Slide model. The Lithium Iron Phosphate battery is believed to be the least harmful to the environment and it is classified as non-hazardous waste for disposal purposes. While we are very happy with the performance and benefits of this “greener” system, going green doesn’t come cheap. This new system has increased the cost associated with our previous battery system by 397%, however the life expectancy of these batteries is at least 10 years or 2000 cycles, defined as the battery going from dead to fully charged as being one cycle.

Another benefit of this new system is that all the batteries communicate on a proprietary network which continuously monitors each battery cell. The status is displayed on an output monitor that enables us to utilize the generator automatic starting system more efficiently by controlling the start/stop of the generator based exclusively on amp hour usage. In addition, the history of each battery is maintained in a non-volatile log which can be retrieved at any time. This may eliminate the need to replace batteries as often on used coaches in the future since we now have an accurate way to determine the need based upon the log file history of the batteries in each coach. It is relatively easy for us to add additional batteries

for more capacity with this system but it’s not easy on the checkbook due to the significant cost associated with each battery. This technology is strictly 24 volt and utilizes DC to DC converters to produce cleaner 12 volt power as opposed to the traditional equalizer used in the past.

This system is now being installed on all Triple Slide H3-45 models. By mid-summer, we will begin installing it on the double slide models as well. The system will save 500 pounds of total weight on the double-slide coaches.

After many hours of research and testing we decided the savings in overall weight, the extended battery life and the reduction of our ecological footprint justified the additional cost of the Lithium Iron Phosphate battery system.

We continually research and test new systems, materials and components to make sure we are using the most reliable, user-friendly and technologically advanced systems available. Our biggest stumbling block sometimes is the reliability of these new technologies. We don’t rush them to production until they have been researched and tested and we feel comfortable that they will perform well in the coach. We believe this new system is a positive change for the future and we are excited to include it on our future models.
